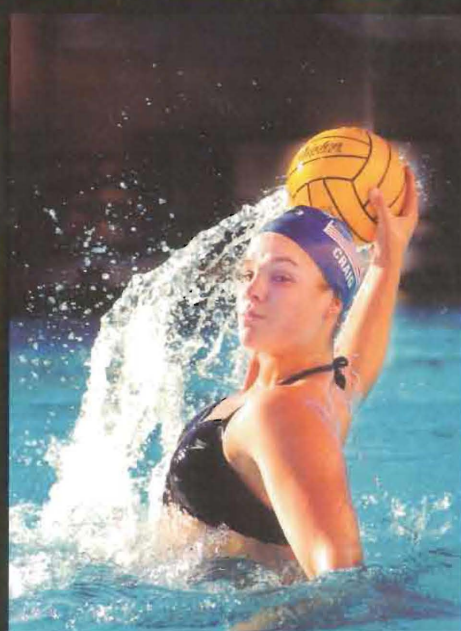
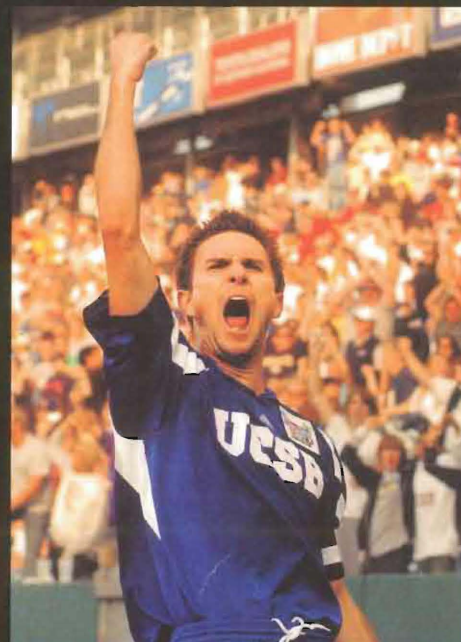

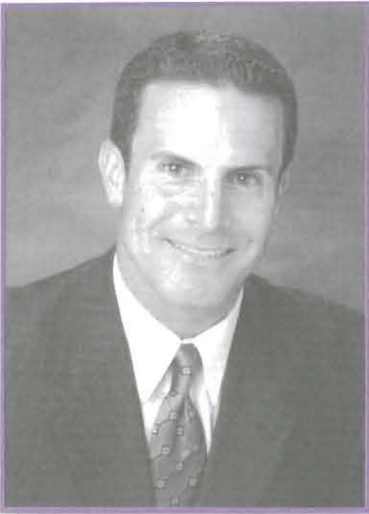

Welcome to the Thirty-Eighth Annual Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table Hall of Fame Banquet.

Tonight is the culminating event, the exclamation point, to yet another tremendous year for this storied organization. As we honor our outstanding local student-athletes, coaches, and community leaders, past and present, it is important to recognize all that has been accomplished over this 2004-2005 Round Table "season."

I am proud to report we hosted thirty-four weekly press luncheons, where we honored and acknowledged: some 1,500 student-athletes, sixty-eight Athletes of the Week, Special Olympic Athletes, ten Scholar Athletes of the Year (one from each high school and college), numerous Sportspersons of the Month, and seven Phil Womble Ethics in Sports Awardees.

None of the above would have been possible without the generosity of our Round Table Members and Sponsors, the tireless effort of our Board of Directors and volunteers, and the invaluable support of our local media. Thank you all.

Focusing on this evening, two very important thank yous must be made. First, the Round Table greatly appreciates the incredible generosity of the *Santa Barbara News-Press*. Tonight, the News-Press is not only the grantor of the first ever *Santa Barbara News-Press Student Athlete Scholarship*, but has additionally stepped forward to be our first ever title sponsor. The News-Press has long been one of our most valuable partners, and with their contributions tonight, that relationship is stronger than ever. Our second and equally important thank you goes to **Helen Jepsen**. Helen is an SBART Board Member and has chaired the Hall of Fame Banquet Committee the past three years. RANDALL CUNNINGHAM

Outstanding Athlete

Randall Cunningham, a 1981 graduate of Santa Barbara High School, was a standout quarterback and punter for the Dons. Cunningham later embarked on a remarkable 16-season NFL career – 11 seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles (1985-1995) as well as playing with the Minnesota Vikings (1997-99), the Dallas Cowboys (2000) and the Baltimore Ravens (2001).

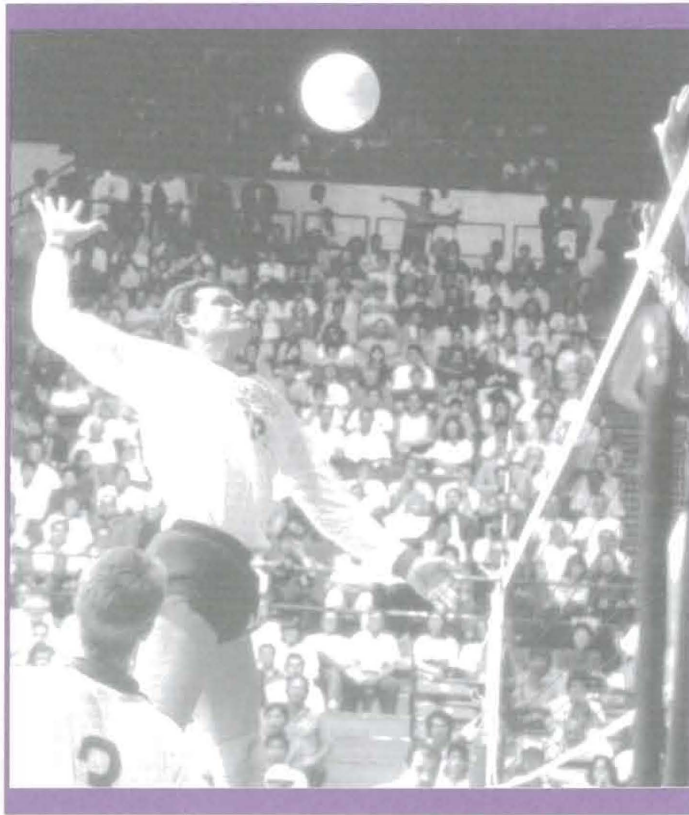
Cunningham amassed 29,979 career passing yards and rushed for 4,928 in 162 games. He retired as the NFL all-time leader in rushing yards for a quarterback. He still ranks in the top 25 in league history for passing yards, touchdowns and completions. Cunningham was a four-time Pro-Bowl invitee in 1988, 1989, 1990 and 1998.

Twice earning All-American recognition, Cunningham starred at quarterback and punter for UNLV in the early 1980s and finished his collegiate career by leading the Rebels to their first bowl-game victory, 30-13 over Toledo, in the old California Bowl held in Fresno on December 15, 1984. Still the career passing and punting leader at UNLV, Cunningham would soon become the 37th pick overall in the NFL Draft when Philadelphia selected him in the second round.

Cunningham, now a minister, lives in Las Vegas. In December 2004 he officially graduated from UNLV with a degree in leisure studies from the world-famous UNLV Harrah College of Hotel Administration.

DON DENDINGER

Outstanding Athlete

A standout basketball and volleyball player at Dos Pueblos High School, Don Dendinger went on to become a first team All-American volleyball player and a NCAA Champion at UCLA and a member of the USA National Volleyball Team.

Dendinger garnered the boys' basketball MVP awards in his junior and senior years at Dos Pueblos as well as the same award for the boys' volleyball squad in his senior year. A first team All-Channel League performer in 1983 and 1984, Dendinger earned first team league honors in volleyball in 1984 as well as a second team All-CIF nod and the Santa Barbara Athletic Roundtable Athlete of the Year award for volleyball.

A four-year letterman at UCLA, Dendinger was the Bruins' MVP in 1988, in addition to his NCAA first team All-American accolades. In one of Dendinger's proudest sports achievements, he and the Bruins won the NCAA Men's Volleyball Championship in 1987, his junior year. In 1989 Dendinger remained with the Bruins as a Graduate Assistant coach to their NCAA Championship team and was a member of the USA National Volleyball Team in 1989 and 1990. From 1992 through 1995 Dendinger made his mark on the Budweiser 4-Man Volleyball, and the Asian Professional Beach Volleyball Tours.

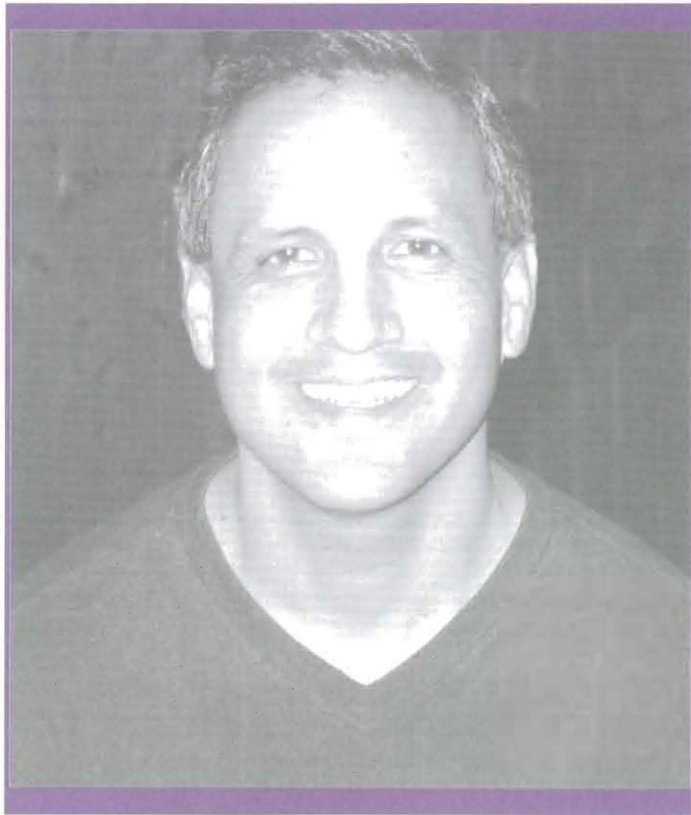
In 1995, Dendinger completed a master's degree in physical therapy at USC with a full scholarship from the Veterans Administration Health Professional Scholarship.

Dendinger notes his parents John and Irene as well as Al Scates, the head UCLA volleyball coach, and Tony Vigna, his Goleta Boys Club basketball coach, as the greatest influences in his life.

Dendinger currently lives in Moraga, Calif., with his wife, Lucy, and their two daughters, Kate and Anna. He is the co-owner of Tice Valley Physical Therapy in Walnut Creek, specializing in orthopedic and sports physical therapy.

HENRY GONZALES

Outstanding Athlete

Born and raised in Carpinteria, Henry Gonzales was a football, basketball and baseball standout in the late 1970s at Carpinteria High School as well as a dedicated coach at the school for 15 years.

Gonzales was the starting quarterback at Carpinteria for three years, 1977-1979. In both his junior and senior year, he earned first team All-Tri-Valley League honors, Tri-Valley Offensive Player of the Year, first team All-CIF and CIF Offensive Player of the year. He was named the Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table Athlete of the Year for football in his senior year. Winning the Tri-Valley League crown in Gonzales' junior and senior years, the team lost in the finals of the CIF playoffs in his senior year.

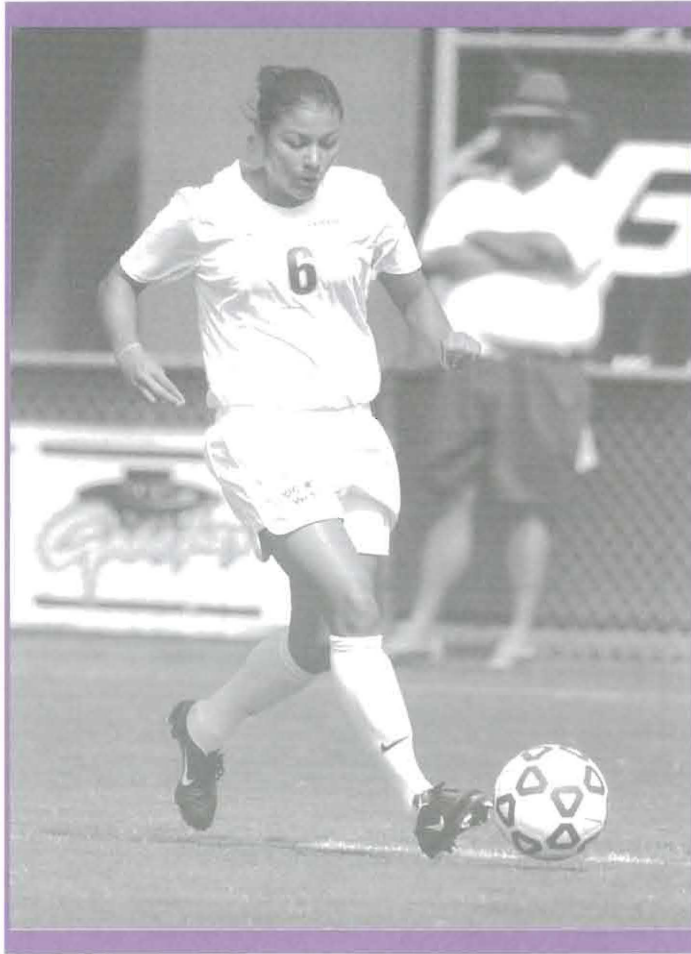
Gonzales enjoyed first team All-Tri-Valley League nods in basketball in his junior and senior years as well as a league co-championship in 1979. Gonzales was also a three-year letterman in baseball. From the fall of 1980 to 1995 Gonzales served in various coaching capacities, from head to assistant at all levels, for the Carpinteria football, basketball and baseball programs.

A 15-year veteran of the Santa Barbara Police Department, Gonzales notes his most difficult moment came in his junior year when a football injury almost ended his high school career. Doctors advised that playing contact sports could result in permanent damage or paralysis. Gonzales chose to take the chance and returned to the field four weeks later.

Gonzales still lives in Carpinteria and says his life has been influenced by his mother Jessie, his brothers Bobby, Frank and Ray, his uncle Ed Rubio, high school coaches Lou Panizzon and Jim Bashore, and Dan Cordero, a youth coach and family friend.

ALMA MARTINEZ *Outstanding Athlete*

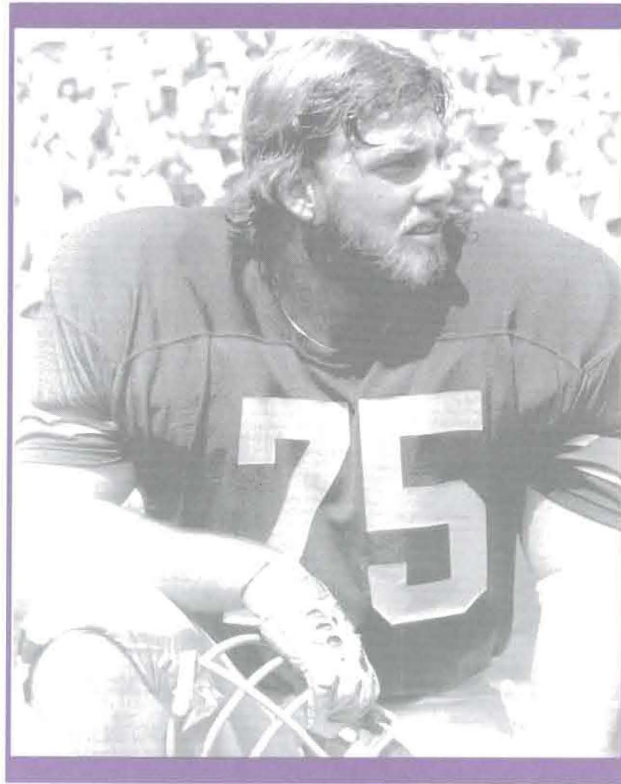
A four-year letterman for the Santa Barbara High School girl's soccer team and 1999 graduate, Alma Martinez notched four CIF appearances with the Dons and garnered Channel League Most Valuable Player and All-CIF honors in her senior year. Martinez, a Santa Barbara native, went on to join the Santa Barbara City College soccer program, enjoying two Western State Conference Championships. She was named All-WSC and All-State in the 1999-2000 and the 2000-01 seasons. Transferring to UCSB in 2001, Martinez was an offensive standout. She expects to graduate in June 2005 with a degree in Spanish Literature.

Martinez earned a spot on the 2004 Mexico National Team as a left midfielder. She scored a goal in Mexico's 8-1 win over Trinidad & Tobago and played 54 minutes in a 2-0 loss to a powerful United States National Team. In the 2004 Olympics in Athens, Greece, Martinez played the entire game against world champion Germany and appeared in the first half in the quarterfinals against Brazil.

Playing at the professional level and being part of the first Women's Mexican National Team appearance in the Olympics are the achievements of which Martinez is most proud, even though training kept her from friends and family. She notes her father, Jose Martinez, and her local soccer coaches – Lito Garcia from Santa Barbara High and Brent Gonzalvez from SBCC – as her greatest influences.

ALLEN PUGH
Outstanding Athlete

A 1976 graduate of San Marcos High School and the school's Male Athlete of the Year, Allen Pugh was a three-sport letterman in football, basketball and baseball. While an All-Channel League performer in all three sports, Pugh's football accomplishments are illustrious. An All-CIF selection in 1975, Pugh was named to Scholastic Magazine's All-American High School Football team in the same year. Pugh's senior year culminated in an MVP Lineman award in the 1976 Santa Barbara County All-Star Football game, playing in the 25th Silver Anniversary Shrine Football Classic at the Rose Bowl and a full scholarship to play football for the USC Trojans where he played on the 1978 NCAA National Championship Team.

Pugh's USC recruiting class included Trojan standouts Anthony Munoz, Charles White, Brad Budde, Keith Van Horne and Jeff Fisher. During his four years as a Trojan, Pugh played alongside future Hall of Famers Ronnie Lott, Bruce Matthews and Marcus Allen. Pugh appeared in three Rose Bowls (1976, 1978 and 1980) and the 1977 Blue Bonnet Bowl. He earned the USC / David X. Marx Scholar Athlete Award in 1980 and was an honorable mention selection to the All-Pac-10 team in the same year. Pugh graduated from USC with a degree in Business Administration.

Not drafted, but pursued by several NFL teams as a free agent, Pugh opted not to try out and began his 20-year career in the telecommunications field working for Pacific Telephone, AT&T and Lucent Technology. Two years ago, Pugh started his own business and is a local business owner and CEO of Gsolutionz, a telecommunication business and business partner of Avaya.

Pugh recognizes Bill Shields, his coach in elementary school athletics, Maury Halleck, his San Marcos basketball coach, Marv Goux and John Robinson of USC and his father as his greatest influences.

Pugh has been married to Janine for over 25 years, and they have three children – all San Marcos alumni and standout athletes – Ian, Justin and Shannon.

POOL RENOVATION COMMITTEE OF SANTA BARBARA HIGH SCHOOL

Community Leader

The Aquatics Booster Club was established in 1999 to support the aquatics program at Santa Barbara High School. In 2002 the ABC formed the Pool Renovation Committee. The committee consisted of Peter Borneman, Lindsey Parton, Mark Edwards, Roe Ann White, Cathy Quijano, Coach Mark Walsh, Kristi Parrish, Betty Flavell, Doug Wilson, Liz and David de L'Arbre, Barry Snyder and Tomaso Falzone.

The vision of the PRC was to rebuild the pool into a 25 yard by 38 meter double deep aquatics complex. In January 2003, the PRC began raising funds to augment \$800,000 of bond money already earmarked for pool reconstruction.

In the course of approximately eight months the PRC worked closely with the architects, the school board, the principal and staff at Santa Barbara High School to refine the design of the facility. The PRC also raised \$370,000 of donations that enabled the expanded plan to become a reality.

Because of a shared vision, a cooperative effort between public education and private individuals, the political support of our elected officials, the committee took this project from inception to ground-breaking in a mere eight months. All of these elements came together to make the Aquatic Booster Club's vision a real success story.

Today, the SBHS aquatics complex is the finest facility of its kind in the area. Of particular importance was the participation by the late J.R. Richards, the SBHS principal and the support of Dr. Flores and the entire school board.

Jack O'Connell was instrumental in getting the project through Department of State Architecture. Also due a special acknowledgement is Larry Crandell whose advice and encouragement kept the committee moving forward and energized.

**DICK HERON, NORM LAMMER & CHUCK WAGNER
BANQUET BBQ TEAM**

Special Achievement

Dick Heron, Norm Lammer and Chuck Wagner kept a streak of manning the barbecues for all of the Dos Pueblos athletic banquets as well as feasts for career days for 36 years – all beginning in 1966, the year the school opened. Lammer, whose son scored the first-ever touchdown for the Chargers, began as a team parent willing to help out; Heron had worked at DP as the equipment manager, trainer and head custodian.

The team would often cook for six or seven banquets a year – banquets held after each sport season to honor the athletes. The busy cooks covered well over 200 banquets without missing a single one. The biggest crowd they had cooked for was 450, but the meals usually included 200 to 250 hungry athletes, parents and cheerleaders. As the number of school sports increased, the work for the barbecue team did as well. In 1966 there were only nine official school sports; that grew to 21. Over the years, the BBQ Team has perfected the menu – meat, salsa, beans, salad and French bread.

These tireless volunteers note feeding and talking with the athletes and cheerleaders over the years as the most enjoyable part of their task.



CATHY SANFORD

Coach

Cathy Sanford taught physical education for 27 years in the Santa Barbara High School District (1966-1993) and girls' tennis for 17. Head coach of the Dos Pueblos girls' tennis team from 1971 to 1984, Sanford's teams notched a 195-28 record in the Channel League with four League titles (1975, 1976, 1982 and 1983) and four League co-championships (1977, 1978, 1980 and 1981).

She guided the Chargers' 1978 and 1980 squads to the CIF-4A finals and the 1979 and 1981-83 teams to the semi-finals. In 1976 Sanford's doubles team of Mary Rose Dell and B.J. Hinchman won the CIF-4A Girls' Doubles Championship, the first-ever for the Channel League and for Dos Pueblos. Sanford also coached CIF-4A singles finalist Kathy Vigna in 1982.

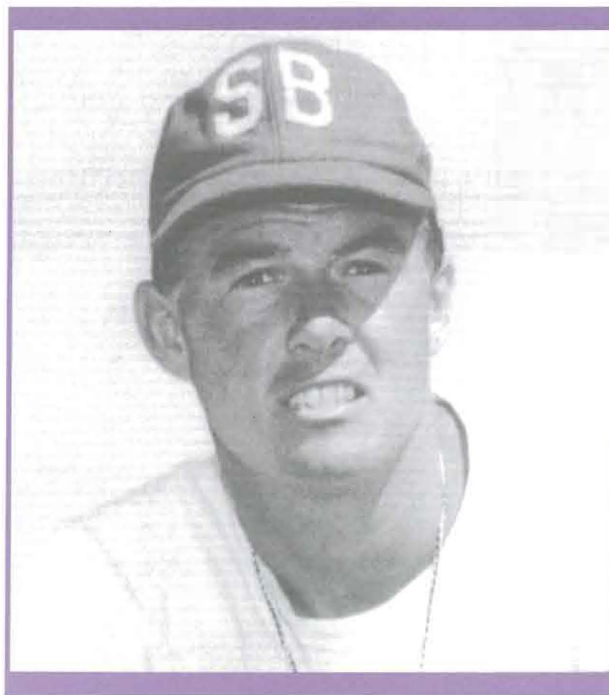
Sanford left coaching in 1985 but continued to teach physical education until her retirement from the Santa Barbara School District in 1993. However, she was lured out of retirement in 1995 to coach the Santa Barbara City College women's tennis team and guided the Vaqueros to a 1996 Western State Conference Championship with an 11-0 conference record and a 12-1 mark overall. The Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table honored Sanford in 1996 with the College Coach of the year award.

Sanford is most proud of winning the 1976 National Championship Equitable Family Tennis Challenge with her son, John, at the U.S. Open Tennis Center at Forest Hills, N.Y. She was also a National Champion finalist at the same tournament in 1983 with her daughter, Julie.

Sanford and her husband Jack, former SBCC men's tennis coach, have six children – three sons and three daughters. Sanford relishes the memories of coaching her daughters on the same 1981 Dos Pueblos girls' tennis team as well as watching all three sons on the Chargers' men's squad. All six of her children have played collegiate tennis. Since retirement, Cathy and Jack Sanford have moved to Carpinteria where she now helps her 16 grandchildren with their tennis. Sanford enjoys taking art classes through adult education and belongs to the Goleta and Los Padres Art Association. Sanford recognizes her husband and her mother, Mae Farrell, as the biggest influences on her life and career.

RUSS WENZLAU

Coach

From 1955 to 1969 Russ Wenzlau was the right-hand man as defensive coordinator to successive Santa Barbara City College head football coaches Bud Revis, Chuck Rheinschmidt and Bob Dinaberg. Wenzlau assisted Revis in forming the first football team at SBCC in 1955 where the program struggled in the early seasons with low player turnout – sometimes as few as 17 athletes at a game. Wenzlau and Revis persisted and finally began to attract some quality athletes.

In 1961, with Rheinschmidt as head coach, Wenzlau and the Vaqueros won their first South Central Conference championship and were invited to play in the Sequoia Bowl. Winning their second conference championship in 1964 was particularly special to Wenzlau as his son, Bruce, was a member of that team.

In 1969, Dinaberg's first year as head coach, the Vaqueros beat nationally ranked Ventura College in a come-from-behind 18-17 victory to win the Western State Conference championship. Wenzlau notes this win as a perfect ending to the football season and his 14-year tenure as defensive coordinator for the SBCC football team. For 10 of those 14 years, Wenzlau was also chairman of the Physical Education Department and served on the committee that approved the plans for the SBCC Sports Pavilion. Wenzlau's first coaching responsibilities at SBCC were as the track coach from 1954 to 1962 during which his teams won three conference championships. He also helmed the men's basketball team in 1958 and 1959.

After retiring from coaching, Wenzlau joined the SBCC administrative staff as the Assistant Dean of Instruction for the Evening College and Summer Session. He continued serving the college in this capacity until his retirement in 1977.

Among Wenzlau's proudest achievements are earning a master's degree in education from Stanford University and serving as a World War II pilot in the Army Air Corps. He notes that he finds the greatest gratification over the years has come from the letters and phone calls of former players who thank him for his direction and encouragement. Wenzlau taps his greatest influences as his father Russell, Lyle Reynolds, his faculty adviser at UCSB and Bud Revis, who first hired him in the SBCC athletic department and is his best friend. Wenzlau lives in Santa Barbara with his wife Carol.

History of the
Athletic Round Table

Nearly forty years ago, Jerry Harwin and Caesar Uyesaka sipped coffee at Caesar's Restaurant, talking about the need for a sports group in Santa Barbara that could help the local athletic community in times of need. After Jerry and Caesar shared a couple more coffee breaks together, the Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table was born. Its motto: The advancement and betterment of all sports and athletics in the greater Santa Barbara area.

The Round Table got off to a fast start. Its first organizational meeting was held at Santa Barbara's East Beach on January 25, 1968. Hundreds of people attended this meeting and over 200 joined that evening as Charter Members.

The Round Table's first annual banquet was held at Santa Barbara City College on June 22, 1968. A number of outstanding athletes in a variety of sports were honored; the evening's highlight was the induction of local athletes into the Round Table's Hall of Fame.

Harry's Plaza Cafe was the site of the Round Table's first press luncheon held on September 14, 1970. The luncheons, initiated by the new president, Bill Bertka, were similar to a "Monday Morning Quarterback Club." All area schools were represented by the head coaches of the sports in season. For 35 years now, the Round Table luncheons have been held every Monday, attended by standing room only crowds.

Since its first meeting back in 1968, the Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table has helped thousands of individuals and organizations by raising funds to support their athletic programs. Through membership dues, contributions, fund-raisers and grant applications, the Round Table has raised more than \$1,800,000!

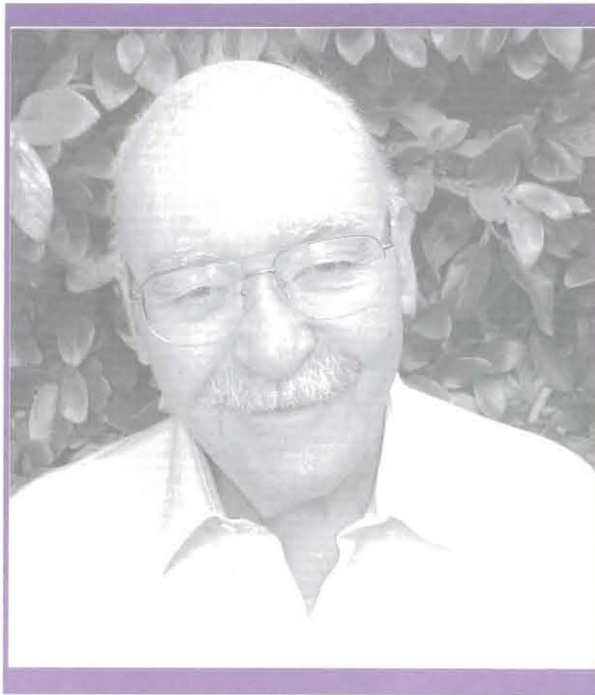

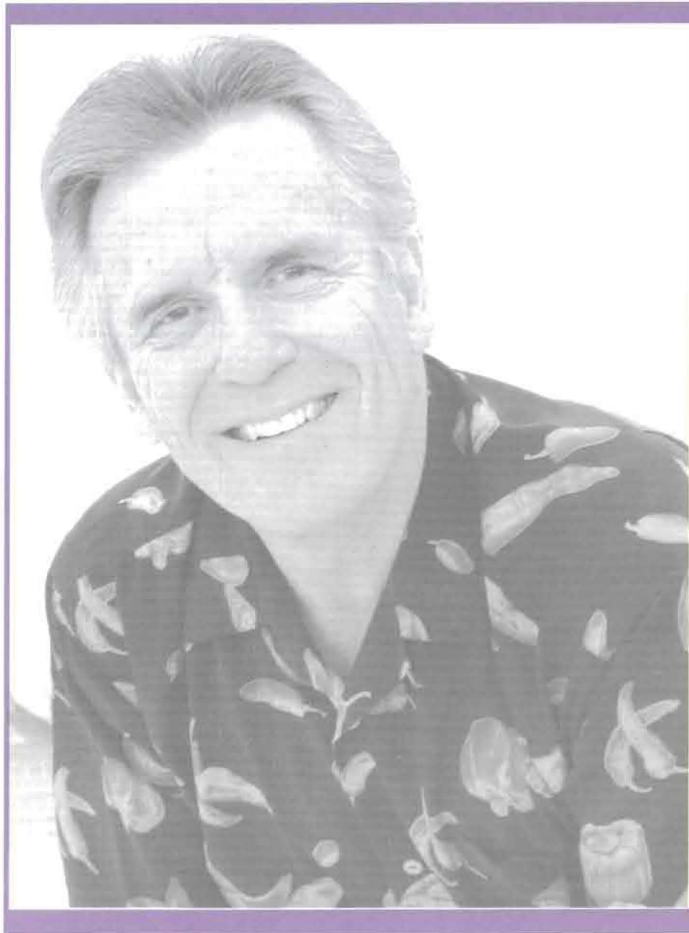
Louise Lowry Davis Award

CHRIS CASEBEER

Chris Casebeer's involvement in Santa Barbara-area sports began in 1966 as a member of the UCSB men's volleyball team where he was selected as a second team All-American in 1968 and played on the Gauchos' 1969 National USVBA Collegiate Champion team.

Casebeer contends that Santa Barbara is the "best small sports town in America" and has done his share to make that statement true. A volunteer coach for a decade, starting in 1988, Casebeer coached his three children in a variety of sports. He has served on the UCSB Athletic Director's Advisory Council from 1995 to the present. A longtime member of the Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table, Casebeer served as president from 2001-2003, helping to create the Special Olympic Athlete of the Month award during his tenure.

In 2002 Casebeer served on the Olympic Torch Run Organizing Committee for the torch's pass through Santa Barbara, spearheading the reception for local Olympians and coordinating the torch's arrival and departure from the Santa Barbara train station. The highlight for Casebeer was watching Phil Womble and Cliff Lambert come down State Street carrying the Olympic torch to a screaming crowd of thousands.

Casebeer hopes his participation in sports leadership in the Santa Barbara community can inspire others to do the same. He says that the facilities, organizations, schools and benefactors – along with the year-round training climate – all conspire to make Santa Barbara a community with rich athletic opportunities for all.

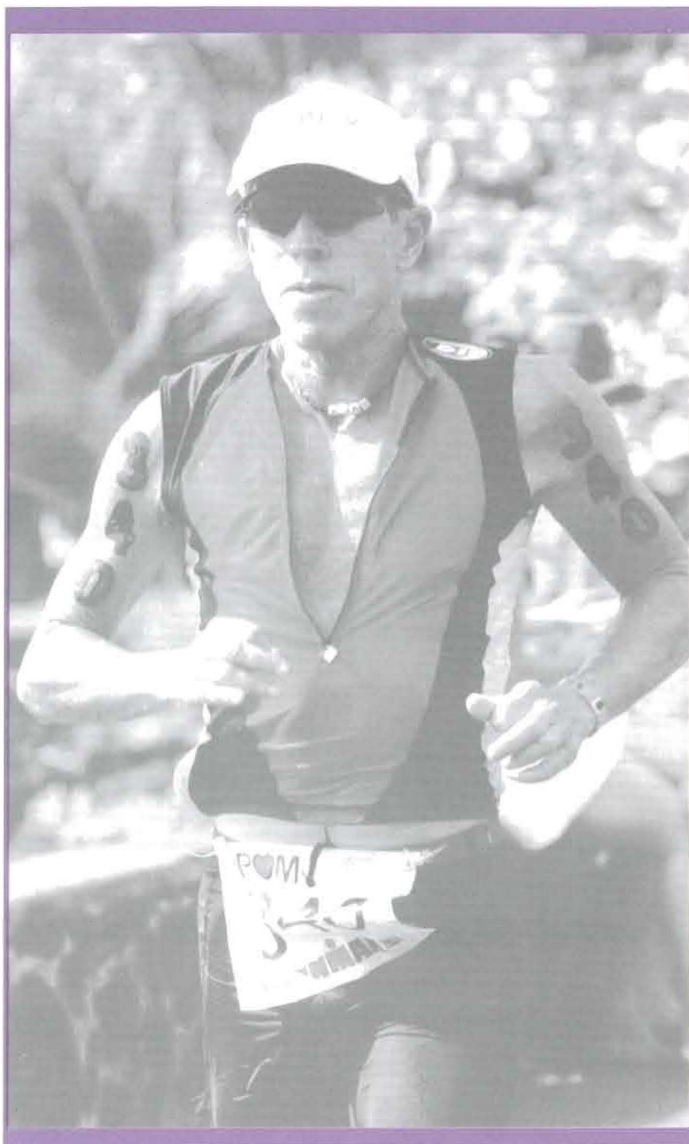
R.F. MacFarland Memorial Trophy

In the triathlon world, Duncan Thomas is considered a legend. His more than 20-year career as one of the world's top triathletes began in 1982. At age 33, he won the Santa Barbara Triathlon, one of the nation's oldest long course triathlon events, and then went on to finish 15th overall at the Ironman Triathlon World Championship in Kona, Hawaii. Duncan won the Santa Barbara Triathlon again in 1984 and 1985 and has completed the Hawaii Ironman eight times.

The annual Ironman event in Hawaii, with its 2.4 mile ocean swim, 112 mile bike course and 26.2 mile run, draws the "best of the best" from all over the world. Duncan has won his age group three times in Hawaii, twice setting a new world record. He last competed in Hawaii in 2004, finishing second in his 55-59 age group.

Duncan lives in Santa Barbara with his wife Terry (who has twice been the top women's finisher in the Santa Barbara Triathlon and is an Hawaii Ironman finisher) and daughter Devin, a junior at Laguna Blanca High School. Duncan continues to run, bike and swim like a champion, inspiring many with his fierce competitive spirit, his gentle manner and good humor. Duncan Thomas is a true master athlete.

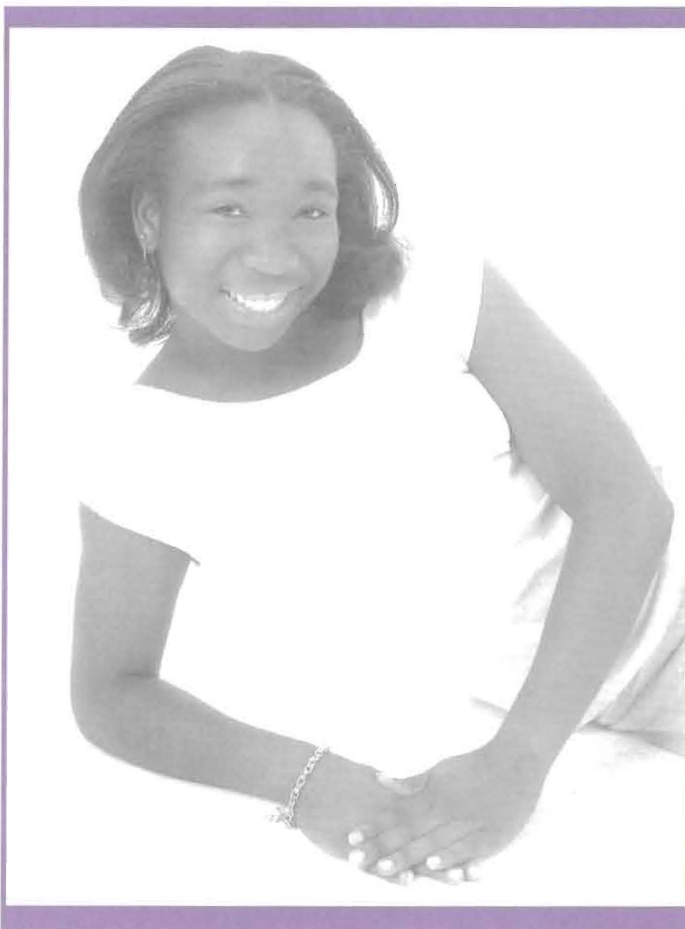
Master Athlete Award

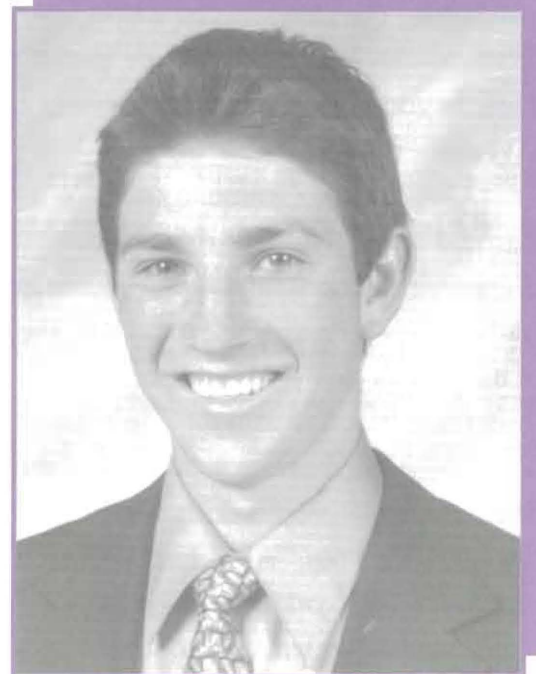
KATIE COY

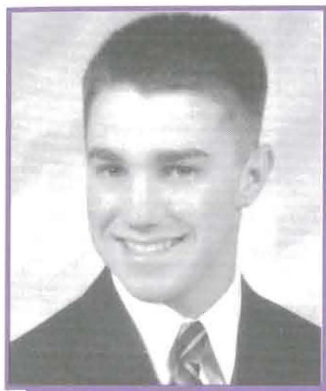

TIM VOM STEEG

UC Santa Barbara

Wrapping up his sixth season at the helm of the UCSB men's soccer team in style, Tim Vom Steeg earned National Coach of the Year honors, the most prestigious in award in Division I men's soccer. The National Soccer Coaches Association of American honored Vom Steeg after he guided the Gauchos to the NCAA National Championship game where they tied Indiana 1-1 through regulation and double overtime, but ultimately lost a heartbreaker on penalty kicks.

In just six short seasons, Vom Steeg has proven to be the best coach in UCSB men's soccer history. He has guided the Gaucho men's soccer program from relative obscurity and a 2-17-1 overall record the year prior to his arrival into the up-and-coming national power that it is today. In the first 33 years of the program's existence, UCSB had never reached the NCAA Tournament, yet while under Vom Steeg they have now played in three straight, culminating in this year's National Championship appearance, improving his overall tournament record to 6-2-1. Currently the 10th winningest active coach in NCAA Division I with an overall record of 87-32-8, Vom Steeg's teams have put together 18-plus win seasons twice in the past three years. The Gauchos set a new school record this past season after leading the nation with a 21-2-2 mark.

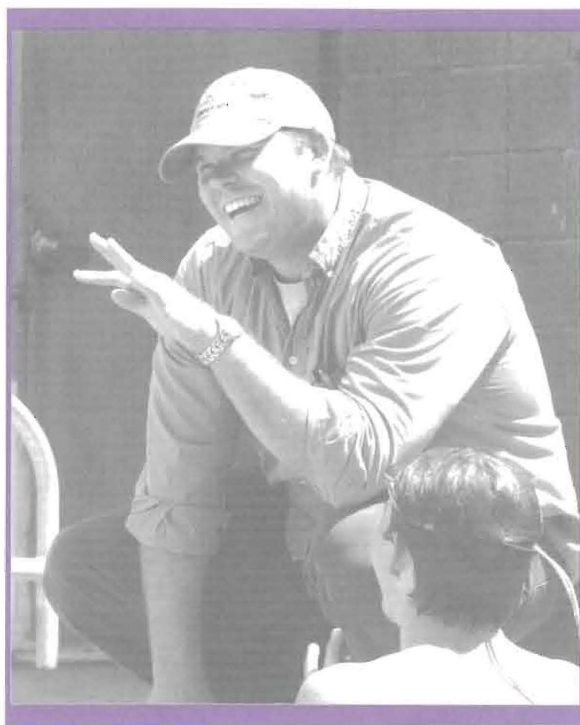
Since the Big West Conference reinstated men's soccer in 2000, Vom Steeg has steered the Gauchos to three conference championships, including this season, helping to earn him the Big West Coach of the Year honors for the first time in his career. Over the course of the past four seasons Vom Steeg has produced four conference offensive players of the year, one defensive player of the year, two goalkeepers of the year and three straight freshman of the year.

Prior to his return to UCSB, Vom Steeg was the head coach at Santa Barbara City College, where he amassed an impressive 121-18-4 (.860) overall record from 1992 through 1998, leading the Vaqueros to five Western State Conference Championships and a 1996 California Community College State Championship. After the state crown, Vom Steeg was named the SBART College Coach of the Year. In addition, SBCC reached the State Final Four four times under Vom Steeg, most recently in his final season, 1998 Vom Steeg was a five-time WSC Coach of the Year choice in his seven-year tenure, and he was also named 1996 State Coach of the Year and Far West Region Coach of the Year in 1997.

Vom Steeg played at UCSB from 1985 to 1988 and graduated in 1989 with a B.A. in history. He received his teaching credential from UCSB in 1990. He and his wife Almeria live in Santa Barbara with their four sons, Justin, Carson, and twins Caden and Jared.

CHRIS PARRISH
Dos Pueblos High School

In only three years at the helm of the Dos Pueblos boys' water polo team, Chris Parrish has taken the Chargers from a last place Channel League finish in 2002 to a tie for the league championship and a CIF Division IV title in the 2004 season, notching a 25-6 record this year. Parrish holds a 51-35 overall record in his tenure at Dos Pueblos.

Also the boys' swim skipper, Parrish's teams have dominated Channel League action since 2003 with a perfect 23-0 three-year record at press time. Parrish's Chargers are currently poised to win Channel League again this year, following 2003 and 2004 titles and a CIF Division I championship last year.

In 2004, Parrish was the CIF Division IV Coach of the Year for boys' water polo and his team garnered the CIF Southern Section Boy's Water Polo Academic Championship as well. In 2003 Parrish saw his team to a CIF Division IV semi-final match and another CIF academic championship. In the past two years, Parrish's water polo and swim teams have notched a total of three Channel League, two CIF and two academic titles.

After Parrish's tutelage, Charger alumni have attended Cal Lutheran, Cal State Long Beach, Colorado State, Cornell, Harvard, Stanford, UC Berkeley, UC Davis, UCLA and USC.

Parrish, a standout water polo player himself at San Marcos High School and Ventura College was named the Channel League MVP and first-team All-CIF in 1993, the year he set the single season scoring record at San Marcos with 136 goals. He was the SBART High School Water Polo Player of the Year in 1994. At Ventura College in 1997, Parrish led the nation in assists and total points and was named a first-team Junior College All-American.

Born and raised in Santa Barbara, Parrish graduated from San Marcos in 1994. He and his wife, Hannah, met in high school and have two sons, Ethan and Blake.

The 2004-2005 Scholar Athletes of the Year Awards are generously sponsored by The Human Performance Center

The Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table Scholar Athlete of the Year Award was initiated in September 1986 after the Round Table's Board of Directors recognized the need to honor those students who are not only successful athletes, but who also maintain strong academic and extracurricular credentials.

Qualifications for nomination include participation in varsity athletics at the high school level and in designated athletic programs at the college level. Academic qualifications include outstanding grade point averages, usually greater than 3.5, in conjunction with other scholarly activities such as honor societies, scientific societies, extracurricular activities and outstanding aptitude test scores for high school. Students have been selected by principals, senior counselors, athletic directors and coaches at the various high schools and colleges in the Santa Barbara area, in association with the Athletic Round Table.

The Athletic Round Table feels that the significance of this award goes beyond recognizing individual students who have outstanding academic and athletic records. It also is a reminder to the community that it is possible for a student to participate in athletics and still maintain outstanding academic achievement. 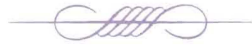

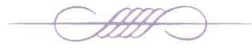

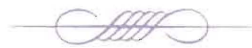
